

RESIDENT DOCTOR APPRECIATION WEEK 2024



MEET THE ALUMNI

Dr. Walid Ghutmi completed his residency training in OBS/GYN in 1996 at AUB. He then pursued his fellowship in Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility (REI) at University College London Hospitals to return to Lebanon and join FakihIVF. In 2003, he established Eve Fertility Center in Beirut and then in Sharjah UAE in 2006. He just finished his tenure as the president of the Lebanese Fertility Society. Dr. Ghutmi is active in attending and lecturing at local, regional and international meetings. He has published several articles in international journals. On a personal note, he is married to Hiba Chatila, and they have three children Michael Khalid, Aya Eve and Ysamina. Their eldest pursued a master's in international finance in Barcelona and Aya is now a third-year premed at UCSB in California, USA.

Dr. Zaher Nassar graduated in 2000 after completing a 4-year residency in OBS/GYN at AUB. He then completed a fellowship in REI in Michigan State University where he was exposed to and trained on the most recent advances in the field of Assisted Reproductive Technology. During his fellowship, he had the chance to publish several articles in prestigious journals and present oral presentations in world-renowned conferences. He then returned to Lebanon and joined FIRST IVF Center until 2007 and later the IVF Unit in Clemenceau Medical Center. He is the director of the unit since 2015. Beyond his role as a physician, he is the father of 4 children Leticia, Angelina, Ayla and Ayman. His eldest daughter is walking a path parallel to his and is currently a premed student.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Broccoli is a flower. The broccoli we consume hasn't fully blossomed. Left unharvested, these florets would unfold into fragrant yellow blossoms.
- Daffodils are used as currency for Prince Charles. He is paid one daffodil a year as rent for his lands on the Island of Scilly and off the coast of Cornwall.
- The roots of the sunflowers were used after the Chernobyl nuclear disaster (1986) to remove up to 95% of the radioactive elements (cesium and strontium) from the soil and ponds surrounding the disaster site.
- One of the world's most expensive flowers is Shenzhen Nongke Orchid. It is a man-made flower that was developed during 8 years of research in China. It only blooms once every 8 years. In 2005, it was sold for ~200,000 USD in an open auction.
- Lilies are beautiful but they are highly toxic to cats and could make them dizzy and ill if they come in close proximity to them.
- While there are approximately 150 wild rose species, over 30,000 cultivated varieties exist today.
- Saffron is a dried spice originating from the lilac flower 'saffron crocus.' The price of the premium quality kilogram could reach €9000-10,000 making it is the most expensive spice in the world. One of the reasons for its high price is that its harvesting cycle occurs only once yearly and lasts only two weeks, and it could take up to 40 hours of labor with 165,000 flowers needed to extract one kilogram of saffron.
- The Yarrow flower is known for its healing properties and was used along with its stem and leaves in World War I to help heal soldiers' wounds and prevent infection.
- During World War II, some families used tulip bulbs instead of onions to prevent starvation.
- It takes two thousand roses to produce one gram of rose oil!
